**Minutes of a Meeting of Cononley Annual Parish Meeting held in Cononley Village Institute
on Tuesday 12th March 2019 at 20.00**

Present: N. Swain (Chair), Cllrs C. Clark, M. Dracup, H. Lambert, R. Minton-Taylor, and D. Timbers.
In attendance: Mrs H. Gibbs (Clerk & RFO); Cllrs A. Brown (CDC) and P. Mulligan (CDC & NYCC); and 13 members of the public

19.01 The Chair opened the meeting and welcomed those present. Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr M. Allum.

19.02 The minutes from the previous year's Annual Parish Meeting were read and approved.

19.03 The Chair of the Annual Parish Meeting gave a report from Cononley Parish Council
Welcome

Good evening and welcome to you all. Thank you for coming to this, your Annual Parish meeting. I must stress that this is not a Parish Council meeting. It is a meeting of residents to which the Parish Council contribute. The Parish Council will be pleased to receive comment at this meeting and all comments received will be noted and included in a future Council meeting.

As Chairman, it is my responsibility to report the progress and activities of the Parish Council since the last Annual Parish Meeting in March 2018.

Parish Councillors

There have been a number of changes in the composition of the Council over the past year. In fact, with the exception of myself and Councillor Mark Allum and of course our Clerk, Helen Gibbs, the entire council has changed over the last year!

Councillors Helen Lambert, Robert Minton-Taylor and Dan Timbers joined the Parish Council in February 2018, filling the vacancies left by the resignations of Lois Brown, Jill Cockrill and Marten Lougee.

Alan Parker, our former Chair, sought not to be re-elected in May 2018. We would like to thank Alan for his sterling contribution to the Parish Council and also to the community over his long tenure.

Kath Clark was appointed to Parish Council in May 2018 to fill the vacancy left by Alan.

Following the resignation of Alan Parker, I was elected as Chairman and Councillor Hugh Rudden elected as Vice-Chairman.

Hugh tendered his resignation in October 2018. We would like to thank Hugh for his superb contribution to the Parish Council and also to the community over his many years. Hugh remains a member of the Cononley Village Institute Advisory Committee.

Following Hugh's resignation, Councillor Helen Lambert was elected as Vice-Chair of the Parish Council.

In February we welcomed Mike Dracup to the Parish Council, filling the vacancy created by Hugh's departure.

Finance

The Council is in a healthy financial state. The Council's funds are used primarily to cover the cost of the administration, insurance, allotments and grants and also the work undertaken by the Lengthsman. These costs are incurred not only to finance the council's responsibilities as a Parish Council but also the Council's responsibilities as the Sole Trustee of two Charities. These Charities are the Cononley Playing Field Trust and the Cononley Village Institute Trust.

Charitable Trust Administration

These two Charities are administered in different ways:

The Playing Field Charity is managed by the Council as the Sole Trustee. The Council does all the day-to-day work and arranges all the income and expenditure directly. Within this, the Council runs the Cononley Gala with the support and assistance of our villagers.

Unlike the Playing Field Charity, the Institute has an Advisory Committee which, as the name suggests, does all the groundwork and day-to-day management on behalf of the Sole Trustee and then advises the Sole Trustee what action to take for the Sole Trustee to make the final decision.

Currently both charities are financially sound with funds available to cover reasonable contingencies. The Parish Council would like to take this opportunity to thank the Institute Advisory Committee for their work during the past year, without which we would not have this vibrant and pleasant environment which is such an asset to the whole community.

Allotments

The Council also manages two Allotment Sites with around 70 plots. These are managed by the Allotments Committee which is a Sub-Committee of the Council and has delegated responsibilities.

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The day-to-day running of the Allotments is in the hands of the Clerk with policy decisions being made by the Allotment Committee. Earlier this year work was started to repair walls and enhance the access.

Planning Applications

Inevitably Planning Applications continues to be a key focus for the Parish Council. We have reviewed multiple applications during the year and have challenged applications by providing feedback to the Craven planning team where appropriate.

We maintain a close eye on progress with the Green's Mill development by Candelisa and are working with them to ensure disruption to our community is kept to a minimum.

As you may know, there will be a planning gain of currently £225k from this development. A team from the Parish Council has been in consultation with the community to determine how this money could be spent.

(More on this later in the meeting).

Progress and achievements over the past year include:

- The Parish Council has facilitated the public meeting to allow the community to voice their concerns and suggestions about how the community could save the shop and post office. Subsequently the Cononley Community Group was formed which is supported by the Parish Council.
- The PC has arranged for the "Unsuitable for HGVs" signs to be erected at approaches to the village
- We have implemented a process to report HGVs travelling through the village
- Following onsite meetings with Highways, roadside delimiter markers and gully improvements on Cononley Woodside
- We are also in dialogue with Highways on parking and road safety issues, particularly along Cononley Lane
- The PC supports the Speedwatch Group, led by Kath Clark, who have recently been awarded funding to purchase an interactive speed sign
- A team from the Parish Council has completed a consultation with the community regarding the S106 planning gain
- We have established a Footpath Working Group set up to improve and maintain footpaths in the community
- We have held discussions with the Yorkshire Wildlife Trust with a view to them helping potentially manage Dead Eye Pond and so to help the community get more from it as a natural asset
- We have arranged improvements to the allotments' boundary wall and pathway (school side allotments)
- We have arranged for the installation of a secure door replacement on the stone shed in the playground

Conclusion

The Parish Council welcomes input and support from the community. Please do come to our monthly meetings here at the Institute (second Tuesday monthly at 19:00, except July when the meeting is the third Tuesday with no meeting in August) with your thoughts, concerns and any information you wish to share.

19.04 County and District Councillor Reports

(a) CDC Cllr Andrew Brown gave his report.

Work remit: Cllr Brown advised the meeting that much of his work is responding to local issues which are usually planning ones but can include traffic, footpaths, potholes in roads issues. Latterly he has become involved with the Cononley Community Shop Group.

Green issues: Cllr Brown highlighted the fact that he is, so far, the only Green Councillor that CDC has ever had. Since his election to the CDC, the District Council is taking green issues more seriously. For

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example, there are no electric vehicle charging points located in any public space in Skipton. However, at the beginning of March 2019, approval was gained for charging points to be placed in public car parks.

Similarly, Cllr Brown advocates for electric charging points to be included in all development plans. Also, when the current rubbish collection vehicles are replaced, they will be replaced with electric vehicles.

Cllr Brown is taking a strong interest in the current controversial issue concerning the potential for Hellifield Flashes and some green area behind Skipton Castle, not to be designated as open space in the Local Plan.

(b) CDC and NYCC Cllr Patrick Mulligan gave his report.

Overview of NYCC and CDC: both councils have faced challenges over the last 10 years, not least the reduction in spending power. The Council pound is now worth 60p compared to 10 years ago., when it was worth 100p. Both councils have done well.

NYCC is facing more cost pressures particularly in health, adult services and schools. In particular, in Special Educational Services there has been an overspend of £5million because the demand for services has risen and continues to do so. To finance the overspend, money has been taken from the referral budget and mainstream schools' budgets. This is obviously a difficult situation all round. What is needed is more certainty over budgets.

CDC used to receive revenue support grants but these have now gone. As a result, the Council tax will have to be raised to help fund services.

However, generally Cllr Mulligan advised that both CDC and NYCC are both well run councils with balanced budgets able to meet the challenges.

Locality Fund: there is currently £5,000 available to spend. Any groups within the village which are engaged in worthwhile projects should contact Cllr Mulligan in the first instance for an application form. So far, the Cononley Bowling Club has put in an application.

VAS and NYCC: NYCC has changed its protocols and it will now allow parishes to purchase VAS and display them in villages. There are restrictions as to the permitted type of sign – they may only display a speed limit and the words 'slow down' – no smiley faces allowed!

There will be some financial assistance from NYCC and will also be eligible for the Locality funding. The signs are battery powered and may only be placed in a temporary location.

CDC projects: CDC has succeeded in winning some grant funding to help with projects. Projects this year have included:

- Towpath improvements from Bradley to Kildwick;
- Railway Station regeneration – a major plan has been commissioned with the aim of giving travellers a better flow into the town from the station. As part of this, the station car park will be moved;
- The Town Hall project – there is now a new museum and stage space in the building;
- The Great Places Project – aimed attracting younger people into Skipton and the Craven district; and
- The Film Festival in Skipton, held in May using public spaces and also aimed at attracting younger people into the locality.

19.05 Playing Field Trust.

The Clerk reported that preparations for the Gala this year is underway with Cllrs Lambert, Timbers and Swain co-ordinating the organisation. Several major items and attractions have already been booked. Cllr Lambert advised the meeting that progress was good to date however, volunteers will be needed both before the day and on the day itself. The date of the Gala is Saturday 15 June 2019.

19.06 Village Institute Trust.

Cllr Minton-Taylor, as Sole Trustee Representative on the Advisory Committee, gave his report.

The Trust's finances are in good shape. Hall bookings continue to be good and the hall is obviously a great community asset.

There will be some renovation work to the clock tower cladding shortly. There is a slight problem of woodworm in the clock tower too.

There are also plans to repaint the building both externally and internally.

The radiators in the toilets will be replaced as they have gone rusty.

Cllr Minton-Taylor expressed his thanks on behalf of the Advisory Committee and the Trustee to Kim Hardy who manages the booking and cleaning of the village hall.

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19.07 Reports by Village Organisations

a) Cononley Village Community Shop Group

Richard Woolf gave the report. The group was formed after a meeting facilitated by Cononley Parish Council in October 2018 after the shop had ceased trading. Initially it was an ad hoc group but more recently has formalised its structure, primarily because the Group needs to open a bank account. The group has deliberately stated its purpose broadly so that it may also look at other locations for a new shop, and not just the old post office/shop building.

The Group has set out the following approach to find out if the shop is really for sale as it is not advertised on the internet:

- A new valuation of the property – shop alone/shop&flat/residential only – has been commissioned
- Once valuations have been secured, then the Group will approach the owners with an offer. However, the offer will not be more than the valuation.

The Railway Pub has also been included in the Group's discussions. Various people have approached Punch Taverns to find out what is happening with the pub since its closer recently. The group would like to know if there is any scope for the community to work together with the new tenant to provide essential services lost since the closure of the shop and the Chinese Take Away.

The Group would like to know what the development plans are for the pub.

The Group are also concerned about the recent closure of the Chinese Takeaway. There is no local knowledge as to the new owner.

b) Cononley Morris Dancers

Report given by the Squire of Cononley Morris Dancers, Richard Gibbs. The side has gained a couple of members this year but has changed the practice venue to the Crosshills Social Club. Practices are held every Friday from 8.15pm. The dance repertoire continues to increase. The side is practising for a May Day dance out and for its traditional gala appearance. All new dancers and musicians are welcome.

c) The W.I.

Report given by Julie. The membership is static and the WI would like to see some younger women coming along. However, the current membership is thriving and the meetings are very well attended with good speakers. Financially, the WI is excellent.

d) The Cononley Singers

Report given by Lois Brown. The Cononley Singers will be taking part in a Music Festival at Christ Church Skipton in mis March where they will be competing for a trophy. All welcome.

e) St John's Church, Cononley

Report given by Lois Brown. Renovations to the church will begin in August. They are expected to take 4 months. This is a big project costing £130, 000. The work will be carried out by Harrisons. During that time, services will be held in the Village Institute.

f) Cinema Club

Report given by Richard Woolf. There is always a good attendance at the Cinema Club. An event to look forward to will be a sing-a-long Mama Mia in May led by the Cononley Singers. The audience is encouraged to come along in dressing up clothes!

g) Cononley Parish Newsletter

Report given by Cllr Minton-Taylor who expressed his thanks to Rana Wall the designer of the newsletter. The newsletter is dependant on contributions from organisations in the village. So please the contributions and pictures coming in.

There is a longer internet edition of the newsletter which is hosted on the Parish Council's website.

19.08 Open discussion, questions and answers:

a) The S106 Committee

Cllr Dan Timbers gave the presentation concerning the Open Space Funding, the text of the presentation follows:

What is the s106 fund?

- Large Development of the Mill site with no open space included
- Contribution to community to improve existing outdoor spaces
- £228k calculated by Craven District Council
- Money to be spent in following areas:
 - Playing fields and recreation ground (including Cononley Sports Club)

- Money due upon completion of 65th dwelling (summer 2019)

Q- A member of the public asked where the new Mutli Use Games Area will be. Cllr Timbers indicated that it is likely to be where the current skate park is located.

Q- A member of the public commented on the fund reserves need to maintain the new equipment. Cllr Timber replied that 10% of the planning gain money is earmarked for maintenance.

Q- A member of the public commented that the Sports Club is chiefly for boys and men and that the Sports Club is also used by non-residents. She also said that more sports facilities were needed for females in the village. The member of the public said that party of the planning gain money allocated to the Sports Club was managed by CDC and shouldn't there be consultation with the village on how this money is spent at the Sports Club? Cllr Timbers replied that this needs looking into.

Q- a member of the public asked if there will be youth shelters. A discussion on the pros and cons of youth shelters followed.

Q- a member of the public asked if the planning gains money could be used as leverage to secure additional grant funding. Cllr Timers replied yes.

Cllr Timbers reminded the meeting that the most difficult aspect in this project was that the committee was struggling for space. The meeting concurred with this.

b) Traffic

Q- A member of the public commented that once the development has been completed there will be an increase in the volume of traffic – more than was originally thought when the planning permission was granted. He is concerned about the Lane End junction with the A629

Cllr Mulligan replied that Highways only reacts to situations. He reminded the meeting of the work needed to secure the pedestrian refuge a couple of years ago. All road works are expensive.

Cllr Clark asked Cllr Mulligan why after having a meeting with Highways nothing seems to be done. Cllr Mulligan confirmed that Highways will only act when somebody gets hurt. Therefore, it is important for the community to log any accidents. Cllr Mulligan will find out why Candelisa are not paying for any improvements to Lanes End.

Q- A member of the public raised the issue of who owns the pedestrian/cycle lane through the new development and who is therefore responsible for the condition of the surface.

At this stage no answer was forthcoming.

18.01 The Chair opened the meeting and welcomed those present. Apologies were received and accepted from Cllrs A. Parker and N. Swain.

18.02 The minutes from the previous year's Annual Parish Meeting were read and approved.

18.03 The Chair of the Annual Parish Meeting gave a report on Cononley Parish Council on behalf of the Parish Council Chairman, Cllr. A. Parker.

The Chair welcomed all to the meeting and stressed that this was not a Parish Council meeting; it is a meeting of residents to which the Parish Council contribute. The Parish Council will be pleased to receive comment at this meeting and all comments received will be noted and included in a future Council meeting.

Changes in the Parish Council this last year

Two resignations were received in December. Jill Cockrill resigned because she was leaving the village and Lois Brown resigned due to other commitments. As the Parish Council was within six months of the next elections, it exercised its right to fill the two casual vacancies through the truncated co-option procedure.

Whilst this process was in progress the Parish Council received the resignation of Marten Lougee, who had previously advised that he would be leaving the Council in 2018, bringing the number of casual vacancies to three.

The Parish Council is pleased to announce that all three casual vacancies have, since the February Council meeting, been filled. The new Councillors are Dan Timbers, Helen Lambert and Robert Minton-Taylor.

Following the resignation of Lois Brown, Councillor Alan Parker was elected as Chairman until the next election as he had already advised he would be standing down in May 2018. Councillor Nick Swain was elected as Vice-Chairman.

Thank you

The Parish Council would like to take this opportunity to thank those councillors who have resigned for the contribution they have given to the Council.

Lois Brown became a Councillor in 2005 and was elected as Chair in 2007. Her knowledge of the village and its residents was extraordinary as were her organisational skills which made her a superb Chair. Her knowledge and skills will be sadly missed.

Jill Cockrill became a Councillor in 2012 and her contribution to the Council meetings and Village Institute Advisory Committee meeting were greatly appreciated.

Marten had been a Councillor for a good number of years in the 90's and early 2,000s and, for some of that time, was the Council's Vice-Chairman. Marten also has extensive knowledge of the village and the local and national railways making him a valued contributor to both the Council meetings and the Village Institute Advisory Committee meetings.

Finances

The Council is in a healthy financial state and, as such, has requested no change in the precept for the coming year. The Council's funds are used primarily to cover the cost of the administration insurance, Lengthman, allotments and grants.

The Parish Council is the Sole Trustee of two Charities

The Playing Field Charity is managed by the Council as the Sole Trustee. The Council does all the day-to-day work and arranges all the income and expenditure directly. Within this, the Council runs the Cononley Gala with the help and assistance of villagers.

Unlike the Playing Field Charity, the Institute has an Advisory Committee which, as the name suggests, does all the groundwork and day-to-day management on behalf of the Sole Trustee and then advises the Sole Trustee what action to take for the Sole Trustee to make the final decision.

The Parish Council would like to take this opportunity to thank the Institute Advisory Committee for their work during the past year, without which we would not be here in such pleasant surroundings!

Allotments

The Parish Council also manages two allotment sites comprising around 70 plots. These are managed by the Allotments Committee which is a sub-committee of the Parish Council; it has delegated

responsibilities. The day-to-day running of the allotments is in the hands of the Clerk with policy decisions being made by the Allotment Committee. A major project of the allotment sites is the repairs to the surrounding drystone walls. Financial provision has been made for this potential project.

Planning applications

A significant amount of time both before and during Parish Council meetings is spent dealing with planning applications related to property in the parish. The legislation allows the Parish Council to comment on certain factors only related to an application. However, there are numerous instances where applications have been either refused or amended following comments relating to local circumstances provided by the Parish Council. The vigilance of the Parish Council will become more important once the Neighbourhood Plan has been approved.

The Neighbourhood and Local Plans

The Neighbourhood Plan is nearing its final consultative phase and should be finally be active sometime during the summer.

The Craven Local Plan is in its final consultative phase and should be finally be active sometime during the summer.

Housing Development within the village

The development of Greens Mill by Candelisa has taken up quite some time at Parish Council and the current situation of a higher volume of cars parking on Cononley Lane is now causing concern. In addition, the Parish Council is keeping a keen eye on building progress to ensure that disruption is kept to a minimum.

Cononley Station

The Parish Council is aware that there are plans to increase the length of trains coming from Leeds and Bradford which stop at Cononley, from the current four carriages to six carriages later this year. However, the Council has been advised that Network Rail do not have sufficient funds to extend the platforms until 2019 at the earliest.

The Lengthman

Our Lengthman carries out tasks in the village. Such tasks include gritting the adopted roads which are not covered by the Highways Authority and also footpaths where required. He also cuts the grass in the playing field and undertakes tasks in the allotments. All of these tasks and others are organised by the Parish Clerk.

The Parish Clerk

Helen Gibbs, the Clerk, ensures that councillors are kept well informed and advised before, during and after meetings. She keeps the wheels of local government in Cononley well-oiled and on behalf of all those councillors who rely on her, may I say a great big thank you, Helen, for all the work you have done for us and the village during the last year.

Conclusion

This report has attempted to give you an idea of what Cononley Parish Council is about. However, we could be an even better Council if you could come along to your Parish Council meetings and tell us of all the good things as well as all of the not so good things. Parish Council meetings are normally on the second Tuesday of each month except July when the meeting is on the third Tuesday and August when there is usually no meeting. They are held here at the Institute and start at 7.00pm prompt. We can only improve if we know what to improve. As the old adage goes – ‘We don’t know what we don’t know!’

18.04 Cllr Rudden introduced Mr Bruce Dinsmore, Sports Development Officer from CDC.

Bruce spoke about the s106 monies of £228,000 (plus an inflation and adjustment element), which have been allocated from the Mill development for five areas:

- (i) Enhancement and maintenance of the village play and recreation ground for children’s equipped play provision;
- (ii) Enhancement and maintenance of the village play and recreation ground for Youth play and recreation provision;
- (iii) Enhancement and maintenance of the village playing fields for recreation provision;
- (iv) Enhancement and maintenance of the village allotment sites for recreation provision; and
- (v) Provision of new play and/or recreation ground to meet the future needs of the community due to demand created by the development

The completion of the 65th dwelling will be the trigger point for the release of the monies. Any allocation must ensure that it meets an identifiable need.

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All the monies can be used on one project.

It is possible to match fund any monies allocated to individual projects.

Any land under consideration for purchase with these monies must be identified in the development plan.

The Parish Council will invite residents to put forward ideas for projects in the near future. It would be wise to begin planning for projects before the trigger point is reached. A community meeting will be held anyway, when the trigger point is reached.

18.05 County and District Councillor Reports

(a) NYCC Cllr Patrick Mulligan gave his report.

Localism fund: there is currently £5,000 available to spend. Any groups within the village which are engaged in worthwhile projects should contact Cllr Mulligan in the first instance for an application form. So far, Cononley Singers have been awarded some funds for a new sound system and the Parish Council has secured funding for a replacement bench on Crosshills Road.

Local authority performance

In comparison to other local authorities such as Northamptonshire which are only undertaking statutory duties, neither CDC nor NYCC are in this predicament. This is because the finances have been kept under control.

The National Office of Statistics named Craven the happiest place and the 8th best place in the country to live.

The Social Mobility study placed Craven 32/352 in the country.

However, there are concerns. In comparison to some small places within the National Park, Cononley is well served with amenities. The National Park has population decline issues and problems with infrastructure. By contrast there has been an over development in urban areas of the county. A solution would be, rather than continuing with the piecemeal development, to create a totally new garden town. Harrogate is looking at this idea.

CDC is doing well. Money from the new homes bonus has been used to good effect as seed money in the town hall renovations and the museum where applications for additional funding have been secured. A similar process is happening for the towpath upgrades.

Local enterprise partnership: £4.7 million received to develop area surrounding Skipton Railway station and Engine Shed Lane. It was noted by a member of the public that the traffic in this area will get worse as a result.

Wearing his NYCC hat, Cllr Mulligan spoke about the following:

Fracking

There had been a lot of protest over the planned fracking at Kirby Misperton, so much so that the energy company had decided to give up and have moved off site. Cllr Mulligan feels that the Government seem to be backing away from promoting fracking as an energy source.

A59 Bypass

There is a good chance of the A59 Bypass around Blubberhouses happening.

(b) CDC Cllr Andy Brown gave his report.

Meadow Lane footpath

Builders working on a property in Meadow Lane have for some time blocked the footpath leading up from the allotments to Meadow Lane. Cllr Brown has complained to the building company on several occasions.

Planning applications

Cllr Brown has put in an objection to the recent planning application on Skipton Road on the grounds that access to the proposed development is dangerous and the proposed development is in an open countryside area.

Cllr Brown has asked the Planning Committee to agree to requiring electric car charging points in all new builds.

Single Use Plastics

Cllr Brown has asked CDC to conduct an audit on single use plastics.

CDC Budget

Even though the budget has been constructed in difficult circumstances i.e. cuts of the last 7 years, Cllr Brown abstained from voting.

The Local Plan

Cllr Brown is concerned that the CDC Planning Committee does not think of planning law in national terms and therefore, the result is development that is not sustainable.

The Local Plan requires a target number of new houses and Cllr Brown's concern is that this development will take place in the first 5-10 of the life of the plan, leaving the developers clamouring for more thereafter.

Cllr Brown is concerned that decisions made by the Planning Committee are subject to appeal by developers.

He is also concerned that the smaller houses are not being built, for example a recent application for 4 bed+ houses in Kildwick was successful.

Fracking

Cllr Brown is pleased that the Third Energy Company found it uneconomic to frack at Kirby Misperton. He does not think the Government are backing away from this energy source.

18.06 Playing Field Trust.

The Clerk reported that the organisation for the Gala this year is underway. Several major items and attractions have already been booked. However, as always, much volunteer help is needed to organise, as this is too big a job for one person.

18.07 Village Institute Trust.

Cllr Rudden, as Sole Trustee Representative on the Advisory Committee, gave his report.

The Trust's finances are in good shape. Hall bookings continue to be good and the hall is obviously a great community asset.

There have been lots of events happening with several forthcoming events, such as the Beer & Gin Festival to look forward to.

A highlight has been the Cinema Club which has gone from strength to strength. It has proved so popular that the Trust has bought its own equipment and has gratefully received a gift from the Secret Drawer of a bespoke cabinet in which to keep the equipment.

Cllr Rudden expressed his thanks on behalf of the Advisory Committee and the Trustee to Kim Hardy who manages the booking and cleaning of the village hall.

Finally, Cllr Rudden announced that after 6 years as Treasurer, Richard Woolf will be standing down. During this time, Richard has done a sterling job with the finances and the administration. He has overseen the upgrade of the hall, which was no small task. Many thanks must be extended to Richard for everything he has done.

Of course, the Trustee and the remaining members of the Advisory Committee are keen to have new volunteers to help them in this worthwhile work.

18.08 Reports by Village Organisations

a) Cononley Morris Dancers

Report given by the Squire of Cononley Morris Dancers, Richard Gibbs. The side has lost a couple of members this year but continues to practice at The New Inn pub the first three Fridays in the month. The dance repertoire continues to increase. The side has danced its first 'outside' dance out at the Community Walled Garden, near Ripon in October last year. And was well received. Other dance outs included the Gala and the recent Musical Mayhem. The side welcomes all new dancers and musicians and is actively seeking a new musician.

b) The Bowls Club.

Report given by Peter Wallbank. It has been a busy year for the bowls club with trouble from the overgrowing trees from a neighbouring property causing problems with the green.

The club would like a new shelter on the other side from the club house as members currently have to use umbrellas when it is raining.

There are plans to run a friendly league this year. The bowling season officially starts at Easter but it is weather dependant

18.09 Open discussion, questions and answers:

(a) A member of the public raised the issue of the lack of electricity to the street light opposite his property on Skipton Road. NYCC have sent out 6 people to look at it but to no avail. Can Cononley Parish Council do anything? The Clerk will write to NYCC seeking a resolution.

The member of the public also mentioned the inadequacy of the light at the end of West End. The Clerk will look into this.

(b) A member of the public raised the question of HGVs coming through the village, blindly following their satnavs. He would like a new sign on the A629 which alerts HGV drivers not to follow their satnavs before they get into Cononley.

Cllr Allum responded that once the Mill development is finished the Parish Council may have an opportunity then to ask NYCC to put up as sign, as there will no longer be a need for heavy wagons to go to the Mill.

Cllr Rudden brought to the attention of the meeting a good sign that he had seen recently on the Oakworth to Gooseye road, which says do not follow your satnavs!

(c) A member of the public congratulated the Parish Council on the recent litter pick. However, she would like to see more signage in the village, and especially near the allotments where dog fouling and discarded full dog poo bags is particularly bad, asking dog owners to clear up after their dogs. The Clerk is at the moment seeking quotations for bespoke metal signs.

The Clerk brought to the attention of the meeting the ability to report offending dog owners to CDC via the website.

(d) A member of the public mentioned the persistent parking on double yellow lines outside the Railway Inn which causes the road at that point to narrow and block. The Clerk will write to Parking Enforcement at Harrogate.

The member of the public also mentioned the increase in parking from the level crossing to Airedale Ings which he felt would cause an accident someday.

In view of the points raised above, Cllr Brown suggested that we need a parking strategy, especially with the anticipated increase in the volume of traffic once the Mill development and other developments in the village are completed.

(e) A member of the public raised a concern about a design of a property for the Mill development which looks like a glasshouse. If correct this type of house was not permitted in the planning application. Cllr Brown will look into this.
